

T-250 SOCIAL STUDIES ELECTIVES (2hrs. 30 min.)

"The Social Sciences - Psychology and Sociology"

This course is designed to examine fundamental concepts of the social sciences. The psychology portion of this course will address the major principles and applications of modern psychology. Students will study the biological, cultural, cognitive and developmental processes responsible for the development of human behavior.

The sociology portion of this course is designed to develop an understanding of the concepts, theories and methods of study found in modern sociology. Students will analyze how groups, societies and cultures address human needs and concerns.

H-120 PHYSICAL EDUCATION (1hr. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students who failed physical education and wish to make it up.

WL-200 SPANISH I (2 hr. 30 min.)

This course is offered to students who failed Spanish I and desire to receive credit. Students who have completed French II may take Spanish I as enrichment. Earning a "C" or better on the final exam will enable them to enter Spanish II the next school year.

WL-210 SPANISH II (2 hr. 30 min.)

This course is offered to students who failed Spanish II and desire to receive credit.

SUMMER STOCK/THEATER WORKSHOP (Grades 3-12)

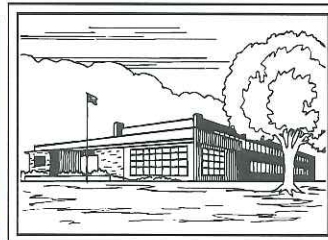

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

The following registration information is for the secondary summer school only. For forms and information regarding other Neshaminy summer programs, call the appropriate office listed herein.

LOCATION/HOURS: Maple Point Middle School, 2250 Langhorne-Yardley Road, Langhorne, PA. **Classes begin Tuesday, July 5, 2011 at 7:10 a.m., and end Friday, August 5, 2011. Pre-registered students** will receive schedules at 7:10 a.m. on Tuesday, July 5, 2011.

ELIGIBILITY: Persons of any age who have completed at least sixth grade.

REGISTRATION: This form must be submitted to Mr. Colin Trickel, 12th Grade Office, Neshaminy High School. Registrations may also be mailed to: **Mr. Colin Trickel, 12th Grade Office, Neshaminy High School, 2001 Old Lincoln Highway, Langhorne, PA 19047.** Private and parochial school students may mail in the application.

DEADLINES: The deadline for ENRICHMENT AND MAKE-UP courses is Friday, June 24. Complete the application form and attach the registration fee. Courses may close as class enrollments are filled.

LATE REGISTRATIONS: Registrations after June 24 must be made to Mr. Colin Trickel, 12th Grade Office, Neshaminy High School. A \$10.00 late registration fee will be charged. Late Registration hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. beginning Monday, June 27. Late registration will be accepted no later than July 1, 2011.

COURSES COMBINED: A course with low enrollment may be combined with a similar course in order to provide a viable program.

COURSES CANCELLED: The summer school office reserves the right to close any course that is filled or to cancel any course for which there is insufficient enrollment.

REFUND POLICY: Registrations fees will be returned *ONLY* when students cannot be enrolled due to closed or cancelled courses. No other refunds will be made!

MAKE-UP COURSES: All classes are 5 weeks. Students in make-up courses will need to meet two administrative requirements:

ATTENDANCE/LATENESS: In order to receive credit, a student may not miss more than 2 days from the date of registration, for any reason, including suspension. Students are to be in their classrooms at the bell; (7:10 a.m. or 9:45 a.m.). Excessive lateness may result in suspension. **SCHOLARSHIP:** Neshaminy students in make-up courses are expected to pass an examination which demonstrates their mastery of the subject matter taught during the summer, and achieve a pre-determined grade in the course as indicated by the principal and counselor.

ENRICHMENT COURSES: Students enrolling in any course for enrichment only must meet minimum levels of competency. Grading will be based on Pass/Fail on the competency only. Requirements are different for courses taken for credit.

TRANSPORTATION: Summer School students must provide their own transportation. No school district buses will be provided.

PARKING: Limited parking space is available for student drivers. Students with unscheduled time between classes are expected to wait in designated areas. Students are not permitted to return to their cars, unless they are leaving school grounds for the day.

CREDIT/GRADES: Grades earned in make-up courses are combined proportionately with grades earned during the regular school year to determine the official final grade for the courses being "made up" and to determine credits awarded. This will be determined by the student's "home" principal.

Credits for Enrichment courses taken for advanced credit are awarded at the rate of 1/4 credit per 30 hours of instruction.

ENRICHMENT COURSES

(Deadline for Registration: June 24, 2011)

M-410 GEOMETRY (9th&10th only) (5 Hours)

Academic Geometry is intended for those students who have successfully completed Algebra I or Algebra I Part II with a final grade of B or better and teacher recommendation. This course will foster an understanding of the special properties of two and three-dimensional figures and emphasizes the relationships among points, lines, angles, triangles, polygons, and circles. An emphasis will be placed on the deductive proof. Neshaminy students who pass the district final exam for Accelerated Geometry with an 80% or higher will be awarded one math credit and will be permitted to schedule Algebra II during the next school year. This is **not** a make-up course.

Pre-requisites: B in Algebra I or Algebra I Part II and teacher recommendation.

M-420 ALGEBRA I PART II (5 Hours)

This course is offered to students who have successfully completed Algebra I Part I by earning a final grade of an A- or better and teacher recommendation. Topics will include utilizing algebraic operations, solving linear equations and inequalities, graphing equations, and solving quadratic equations. This course is a continuation of the study of the real number system. Neshaminy students who pass the district final exam for Algebra I Part II with an 80% or higher will be permitted to schedule Accelerated Geometry the next school year in 9th grade. This is **not** a make-up course.

Pre-requisites: A- in Algebra I Part I and teacher recommendation.

M-430 ALGEBRA II (5 Hours)

Academic Algebra II is intended for those students who have successfully completed Algebra I and Geometry with a final grade of B or better in each course and teacher recommendation. The course will move through a sequential study of inequalities, linear and quadratic functions, polynomials, higher degree equations, exponents, complex numbers, conic sections, and coordinate geometry. Neshaminy students who pass the district final exam for Honors Algebra 2 with an 80% or higher will be awarded one math credit and will be permitted to schedule Pre-Calculus during the next school year. This is **not** a make-up course.

Pre-requisites: B in Algebra I and Geometry and teacher recommendation.

MAKE-UP COURSES

(Deadline for Registration: June 24, 2011)

Neshaminy Students: To enroll for a make-up course, a student must obtain approval from both his/her principal and guidance counselor and agree to meet certain pre-determined grade requirements. The registration form may be used for this.

- STUDENTS WILL BE EXPECTED TO PASS COMPETENCY TESTS IN ALL MAKE-UP COURSES.
- STUDENTS MAY PURSUE MAKE-UP COURSES FOR THEIR OWN ENRICHMENT OR GRADE IMPROVEMENT (NO CREDIT).
- SPECIAL EDUCATION STUDENTS WILL BE PROVIDED FOR APPROPRIATELY.

M-210 EAP Math - Standards Math and Problem Solving (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to 9-12 graders who have scored *Basic* or *Below Basic* on their PSSA's and or 4Sight tests and therefore are required to take the course during the school year. By taking this summer course and scoring proficient in two consecutive 4Sight tests, a student may meet the requirement.

M-220 ALGEBRA I (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to students who did not pass Algebra I or Algebra I Part II and desire to receive credit. The course will cover the basic concepts and principles of Algebra, which includes utilizing algebraic operations, solving linear equations and inequalities, graphing equations, and solving quadratic equations. In order to receive credit the student must pass the district final exam for Algebra I with a 70% or higher.

M-230 ALGEBRA II (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to students who did not pass Algebra II and desire to receive credit. Topics will include quadratic functions, systems of equations, variations, irrational expressions, complex numbers, functions, and coordinate geometry. In order to receive credit the student must pass the district final exam for Algebra II with a 70% or higher.

M-240 GEOMETRY (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students who did not pass Geometry or Accelerated Geometry and desire to receive credit. This course will target topics including inductive reasoning, distance and angle measurement, angle and triangle relationships, triangles and congruence, parallel lines, and circles to name a few. Less emphasis is placed on geometric proofs. In order to receive credit the student must pass the district final exam for Geometry with a 70% or higher.

M-250 PRE-ALGEBRA (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students in middle school who did not successfully complete Pre-Algebra. Topics will include integers and exponents, analyzing data, perimeter, area, volume, ratios and similarity, probability, percents, and solving equations and inequalities. Students will be required to take the district final exam for Pre-Algebra.

M-260 ALGEBRA/GEOMETRY 1 - 3 (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students who did not pass Algebra/Geometry 1, 2, or 3. The topics of each course progressively include essential content in operations of numbers, algebra, geometry, and data analysis and probability. In order to receive credit the student must pass the district final exam for the course with a 70% or higher.

M-270 MATH 6TH GRADE (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered for those students that did not successfully complete the 6th grade mathematics program. Topics will include whole numbers, decimals, fractions, number theory, proportions, measurement, and geometry along with other core math concepts. Students will be required to take the district final exam for the course.

S-210 LIFE AND EARTH AND SPACE SCIENCE (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students in grades 7 or 8 who failed science. Topics are selected from the middle school general science curriculum which includes Biology and Earth and Space Science.

S-220 PHYSICAL SCIENCE (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students who failed ninth grade physical science. Topics studied will be related to the big ideas in Introductory Physics (forces, conservation of energy) and Chemistry (properties of atoms, chemical bonding, and transformation of energy) as they are defined in the state and national science standards.

S-230 BIOLOGY (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students who failed Biology I. Topics for this course will be related to the big ideas in biological science (chemical evolution of life, homeostasis, taxonomy and evolutionary classification, ATP, energy as it relates to the food pyramid, protein synthesis, cells come from pre-existing cells, heredity, and natural selection) as they are defined in the state and national science standards.

S-240 CHEMISTRY (2hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to those students who failed Chemistry I. Topics for this course will be related to the big ideas in chemical sciences (properties of matter, atomic theory, chemical bonding, periodic trends, and chemical reactions.) as they are defined in the state and national standards.

L-210 ENGLISH 6-8 (2hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to students in middle school who have not successfully completed English and wish to receive credit. The curriculum will address features of writing such as vocabulary, sentence structure, and usage through student writing. Students will begin by writing paragraphs, progressing to the multi-paragraph essay, and will read nonfiction and a variety of short stories in a review of the elements of fiction (characterization, plot, setting, point of view, and theme).

L-220 ENGLISH 9-12 (2 hrs30 min.)

This course is offered to students in high school who have not successfully completed English and wish to receive credit. Building upon skills taught in middle school, students will develop as readers and writers using grade-appropriate texts. All multi-paragraph essays will follow the guidelines of the PA Writing Rubric. Students will read short fiction, focusing on literary elements, as well as nonfiction with an emphasis on current events.

L -230 EAP Reading – Literacy Workshop (2 hrs. 30 min.)

This course is offered to 9-12 graders who have scored *Basic* or *Below Basic* on their PSSA's and or 4Sight tests and therefore are required to take the course during the school year. By taking this summer course and scoring proficient in two consecutive 4Sight tests, a student may meet the requirement.

T-210 MIDDLE SCHOOL SOCIAL STUDIES 7-8 (2 hrs. 30 min.)

7th grade – "World History: Rome to Renaissance"

8th grade – "American History: 1776 – 1850"

This course is designed to strengthen the skills of historical analysis such as identifying bias and analyzing cause and effect relationships. Students making up credit for their seventh grade year will develop these skills while studying the period of world history from the founding of Rome to the Renaissance. Students making up credit for their eighth grade year will analyze the principles of the Constitution and study major events from the founding of the United States until the eve of the Civil War.

T-220 SOCIAL STUDIES 9 (2 hrs. 30 min.)

"American History: The Civil War – World War II"

This course is designed to strengthen student understanding of the evolution of the five American ideals (equality, liberty, rights, opportunity and democracy) promised in the Declaration of Independence. Students will develop skills of historical analysis such as identifying bias and understanding cause and effect relationships while studying key developments in American society from the Civil War to World War II.

T-230 SOCIAL STUDIES 10 (2 hrs. 30 min.)

"World History – The Renaissance – World War II"

This course is designed to explore historic developments in World history. The skills of historical analysis will be developed while students analyze the political, economic and religious systems within a historical framework. Major World events from the Renaissance through World War II will be the focus of study.

T-240 SOCIAL STUDIES 11 (2 hrs. 30 min.)

"American History: The Civil War – Modern Times"

This course is designed to strengthen students' understanding of the history of the United States from the Civil War to the modern era. Students will examine key events from this period to develop the skills of historical analysis such as identifying bias and understanding cause and effect relationships.
