NSD offers camps, programs, academic help

School is a Summer Place

Even though you may have just put the snow shovels and boots away for the season, summer is coming fast and it is time to think about summer programs for school-age children. Once again, Neshaminy is offering a variety of programs for district students that can help them maintain and build their academic skills, explore the arts, or experiment with science and technology. Each has a different purpose, but all are designed to enhance the curriculum during the rest of the year. All programs listed below meet at Neshaminy High School unless otherwise noted, and have varying costs. More information on each program can be found on the district web site, www.neshaminy.org.



Summer Stock Theater (entering grades 3-5 and 6-12):

Part of the Summer Fine Arts program and open to all Bucks County students, this program has been teaching all aspects of theater arts for over 40 years. The younger students focus on theater basics such as stage direction, character development and basic dance. They will be performing 'Honk! Jr' during the workshop, and also be in the senior production. The older students collaborate with professionals to produce a full-length Broadway production. This

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Students Navigate Naviance

Scheduling classes, choosing a career path and planning for college can be a daunting task for secondary school students. Neshaminy has introduced a new online tool to help them with everything from researching careers and colleges to planning what classes they should be taking in high school to achieve their goals and help finding appropriate scholarships.

Naviance, which is available on the web and as an app on mobile devices, started in 2002 as a college search service but has expanded over the past several years to become a complete 'Career Readiness Solution' geared to middle and high school students. Students in grades 9-11 at Neshaminy High Schools received Naviance Family Connection accounts and training in the system this year, and moving forward all students in grades 9-12 will be using the system.

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geared toward their age group and needs. A ninth-grader, for example, might see more information about careers and what high school classes would be appropriate for those careers. Seniors would see more information about colleges and scholarship opportunities that take into account their academic record, interests and stated goals.

When students first begin using the system, they take a personality assessment test, similar to those that have been used by guidance departments in the past. In Naviance, however, the data can be cross-referenced with college and career databases that allow students to explore various options in great detail, and even let them see how other students from the district and across the country achieved their life goals. Users can research college programs, acceptance statistics by geographic region or school, take a test prep course, and get real-time data-driven advice on how to achieve college and life goals.

The system also offers tools such as a journal to keep track of extra-curricular and community activities, a resume builder that can be used to help secure a part or full-time job, and an integrated electronic college application tool that allows them to apply their stored information, apply and track the status of their applications after they are submitted.

Naviance is designed to be an integral part of the high school guidance department, and even offers a messaging tool that allows students to schedule appointments with guidance counselors or just ask a question. Parents can also log in to view their children's information and progress.

year these students will be staging 'Les Misérables (Student Edition)' during the workshop.

Instrumental Music Program (entering grades 3-12): Also part of the Summer Fine Arts program, lessons are provided for string (entering grades 3-12), percussion and wind instruments (entering grades 4-12).

Summer STEM Academy (entering grades 4-8): Offers several courses and two-week camps focusing on such areas as engineering, robotics, computer programming and digital modeling. New this year is the nationally-recognized Camp Invention, a two-week STEM camp created by the non-profit National Inventors Hall of Fame.

Neshaminy Summer School (entering grades 7-12): Now in its 58th year, this program provides graded courses in a variety of subjects for both academic enrichment and remediation purposes. Courses are open to both residents and non-residents (tuition varies).

NHS Jump Start (entering grades 9-12): This unique, non-graded, free program provides a high quality introduction to course work students will encounter during the school year in multiple subjects such as algebra, biology, chemistry, calculus, history, physics and more. An 'Everyday Writing Lab' is also offered to help students improve their presentation skills at all grade levels.

Non-open enrollment programs: The district offers programs for students with specific needs identified by NSD staff. **The Elementary Summer Tutoring Program** offers assistance in reading and math to children entering grades 2-5. Students are invited to participate based on an established set of criteria.

Summer Pass is grant-funded camp-like program designed for middle school students that helps them develop their social, physical and academic skills. Included is classroom lessons, recreational activities, community service projects and field trips that combine creative learning skills, teamwork and career development. Students are identified

for the Summer Pass program through the guidance staff at their school.

Non-district programs: The **Neshaminy Kids Club** offers a variety of summer camp options and classes at Oliver Heckman, Pearl S. Buck and Lower Southampton Elementary Schools for grades 5-8 from June 15 - August 27. For information navigate to www.neshaminykidsclub.org.

CONSOLIDATION UPDATE

Tawanka bids accepted

On April 29, Neshaminy School District received public bids for nine contract packages for the construction of the new Tawanka Elementary School in Lower Southampton Township.

The total of the bids from the apparent low and responsible bidders for each package, including alternate project additions to be recommended to the Board of School Directors by the District Administration, was \$26,003,269. The project amount is approximately 10.4% below anticipated costs, and even further under the limits set by the Pennsylvania Department of Education for new construction for this project. The total cost of the work will be in the target range envisioned by the School Board since the onset of the project.

The alternate projects included are: extra storage cabinets in all classrooms; three bus canopies outside the school, and automated lighting controls to enhance energy savings during daylight hours.

Project bid costs were driven down by diligent value engineering and scope selection, as well as competition generated from a significant bid solicitation effort.

The project architect is Spiezle Architectural Group, Inc. and the construction manager is Reynolds Construction, LLC. Demolition, site preparation and construction are expected to begin this summer.

5-8 GRADE TRANSITION UPDATE

While Everitt Elementary School is scheduled to close at the end of the current school year as part of a building consolidation plan, it will not do so without a farewell party.


According to Principal Andre Modica, two events are planned to celebrate the history of the 60-year-old building and offer Everitt families and the community a chance to get together to reminisce.

Ronnie, who now lives in Montgomery County, spoke to the students then took questions following the presentation.
