Reading Fluency:

Redding itinerdry

Have your student read out loud song lyrics, menus in restaurants, or any informational text. Have your student read out loud to practice reading fluently.

Reading Comprehension:

When reading here are some activities you can do to help with reading comprehension. Pick out ones your child would find most interesting and fun. You do not need to do all of them!!! ©

*Through Out The Book Adventure:

As your child is reading or has finished their book, ask these questions. Cut the questions up and glue onto popsicle sticks. Place in a jar and pull one out 2-3 each time you read.

*Traveling Through The Text:

As your child is reading, have them share what they are thinking about as they read. At first have them just put the icons down. For example, if they thought a part was really funny they would draw a happy face. Then after they have practiced the skill of annotating, have them draw the symbol and write why they picked that symbol.

Reading Non Fiction Text:

Reading non fiction text can be so fun! Have your child share what they learned by choosing 3 different ways to display their learning. Let them host a non fiction learning night around the campfire.




Commences	Visit the Scholastic book site where students can log reading hours to win digital prizes, and help set a new world record for summer reading. Scholastic com/summer
2	Visit your local libraries to sign up for summer reading programs.


